Contrary to popular belief, the University of Phoenix and other for-profit providers represent only a small fraction of online education. Recently, prestigious non-profit universities have begun offering free courses as well as inexpensive online degree programs. We show that these courses provide new educational opportunities to non-traditional demographics including driven children, curious grandparents, and working professionals. Moreover, these courses transcend geographic boundaries reaching developing countries and refugee camps.

Over 70% of online education is now offered by nonprofit providers
